Receiving Gifts

I BELIEVE JUST ABOUT EVERYBODY who thinks about December thinks about Christmas. The weather may vary: Some years we have mountains of snow, while others have fields covered with green grass. Some years temperatures barely rise above freezing, while other years have people in short sleeves all month. No matter what changes come about in December, one thing that never changes is Christmas.

Christmas always brings the same dilemma: Gifts. No matter where we live, what generation we are in or where we are in our lives, December brings thoughts about giving and receiving gifts.

That reminds me of a short story I have read and used in classrooms with kids of all ages in my previous life as a teacher, "The Gift of the Magi." The story is neither long nor complicated. It tells of a young couple who are married and living on limited financial means. They both want to give something that is meaningful, but with their limited budget they don't know what that would be.

The wife had long beautiful hair, which meant a lot to her, and the husband had a pocket watch, which had been in his family for three generations. I am going to greatly shorten the story to a couple of sentences for this column. In short, the wife sold her hair to buy a fob for her husband's watch and the husband sold his watch to buy combs for his wife's hair. She no longer had hair for the combs he had bought, and he no longer had a watch for the fob she had bought.

I think the meaning of the story was about the values of the gifts we give. Each of the characters in the story gave up something dear to them to give to the other. It is a worthwhile theme and one I have always hoped would mean something to the kids who read it.

I have concluded that there is no "perfect" gift, so I am not going to write as I often have about what to give. This month, I would like everyone to think about not what we give but what we receive. In my case, I have been receiving gifts for longer than I can remember, so rather than tax my memory for some that were meaningful, I am going to think about the gifts I have received from nature. Each and every one of them has been precious and meaningful.

I have been blessed to have a garden every year, from the two-acre gardens where we grew produce to sell at the barn store to the 30-foot-by-50-foot gardens at our "new" house. These new gardens have given us enough beans to fill a freezer, tomatoes to fill shelves with jars of sauce for the winter, peppers to stuff in the freezer, and squash to keep for a few months for the table. I did not realize it at the time, but in retrospect, those gardens were gifts from nature that kept me connected to the land, even as that connection sometimes grew a little strained.

I have also been blessed to see a lot of sunrises and sunsets. Even though the location of our new house means a view of sunsets is mostly limited, the tradeoff is a view to the east over a field and some woods for a truly gorgeous sunrise. Those views, even the limited one at sunset, remind me of the old prediction: "Red sky at morning, sailors take warning. Red sky at night, sailors delight." Surprisingly, it is pretty accurate.

Just like a gentle spring shower is a gift from nature, so is a violent downpour. Those winter scenes that inspired Robert Frost also make us shiver in the cold. Even though we don't always recognize the gifts from nature, they are gifts, none-theless. The next time you see a colorful sunrise, remember it may forecast a blizzard. They are both gifts from nature.

2025 United Electric Board Elections will be Held for Districts 4 & 5

United Electric Cooperative members residing in District 4 and 5 will be eligible to vote in the 2025 director elections.

The 2025 United Electric director elections will be held in May. Members residing in Districts 4 and 5 are eligible to run for the board (See Districts 4 and 5 by county and township listed below). A mail-in ballot will be sent to every member in Districts 4 and 5. Mail-in ballots provide everyone in these districts the opportunity to vote, including those who do not, or cannot, attend the annual meeting. United Electric

Cooperative's 2025 Annual Meeting will be held Wednesday, May 21, 2025, at the Brady Township Community Center in Luthersburg. More information about the 2025 election will be provided in future issues of *Penn Lines*.

Members residing in Districts 4 and 5 who are interested in running for the United Electric Board of Directors should read the following bylaws carefully.

UNITED ELECTRIC BYLAWS

ARTICLE IV - BOARD MEMBERS

SECTION 2. Districts (excerpt).

DISTRICT NO. 4. Cambria County - Susquehanna Township; Clearfield County - Bell, Burnside, Chest, Ferguson, Greenwood, Jordan, Knox, Lumber City, Penn, and Pike Townships; Indiana County - Banks Township; Jefferson County - Bell, Gaskill, and Henderson Townships.

DISTRICT NO. 5. Clearfield County - Bloom and Brady Townships; Jefferson County - Pine Creek, Warsaw, Washington, and Winslow Townships.

SECTION 3. Qualifications.

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a Director of the Cooperative who is not a member in good standing of, and receiving electric service as required in Section 2. hereof from the Cooperative at such member's primary residential abode for a minimum period of one continuous year immediately preceding his/her election within the particular district which such member is to represent. No person shall be eligible to become or remain a Director of, or to hold any other position of trust in, the Cooperative who:

- (a) is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise; including, but not limited to, the sale and distribution of electric power;
- (b) is engaged in regularly selling at wholesale or retail, goods, equipment, or material that is used in and about the business of the Cooperative;
- (c) is unwilling to become acquainted with the business and working of the Cooperative;
- (d) does not complete half (50%) of the required NRECA Director Certification Training within three (3) years of election or appointment, and complete NRECA Director Certification at the conclusion of the Director's second term in office;
- (e) shall miss three (3) consecutive regular meetings of the Board without just cause and excuse filed with the Secretary and approved by the Board;
- (f) is not willing and able to attend all regular and special meetings of the Board, unless prevented by unavoidable circumstances;
- (g) is in any way employed (or is the spouse of an employee) by the Cooperative or has been an employee (or is the spouse of a former employee) of any electric cooperative or association;
- (h) has been convicted of a felony within the last five (5) years;

- (i) is the parent, husband, wife, son, daughter, brother or sister of a person regularly employed by the Cooperative, whether by the whole or half blood or by adoption.
- (j) has been removed as a Director of this Cooperative by vote of the Members or the Board. 'Ineligibility' under this subsection may be waived by the Board, at the Board's sole discretion, if the Director was removed by the Board.

Upon establishment of the fact that a nominee for Director lacks eligibility under this Section or as may be provided elsewhere in these bylaws, it shall be the duty of the Judge of Elections, as hereinafter provided, to disqualify such nominee. Upon the establishment of the fact that any person being considered for, or already holding, a position of trust in the Cooperative lacks eligibility under this Section, it shall be the duty of the Board to withhold such position from such person, or to cause such person to be removed therefrom, whichever be the case. Upon establishment of the fact that a Director is holding office in violation of this Section, it shall be the duty of the remaining Directors on the Board to remove such Director from office. Nothing contained in this Section shall, or shall be construed to, affect in any manner the validity of any such action taken at any meeting of the Board of Directors; PROVIDED the action taken was one in which none of the Directors had an interest adverse to that of the Cooperative.

SECTION 4. Nominations.

All incumbent Directors are automatically nominated to run for the office of Director and shall be one of the nominees to run for the office of Director, unless they decline and/or refuse to run. Any additional nominations for director shall be made by the submission of a written petition signed by not less than twenty-five (25) members of the Cooperative in their respective district. Such petition shall contain the following information:

- 1. Statement Release for Background Check Information;
- 2. Signed Review of the Director Oath of Office;
- Signed statement that petitioner has reviewed the qualifications and is eligible to be elected as a Director of United Electric;
- 4. Brief Biography of Petitioner.

All such nominations by petition shall be addressed to the Judge of Elections and must be received at the Cooperative headquarters office no later than 4:30 p.m. on the last business day in January immediately preceding the annual meeting.

Nominations by petition not received in a timely manner or with incomplete, untrue, or inaccurate documentation will be disqualified. There will be no nominations taken from the floor and there will be no write-in candidates.
